Brixton Warehouse The Brixton Warehouse is a former warehouse in Brixton, south London. During the 19th century, it was the location of the main steam pumping station for the Metropolitan Water Board of London. Following the Metropolitan Water Board's closure, the building was used by the Greater London Council's South London Development Corporation as a warehouse and, since 1998, as the home of the Brixton History Centre. It has been restored and is a Grade II listed building. History By the 1840s, Brixton was being developed as an increasingly prosperous suburb of London, and its water supply increasingly relied on pumped steam. In 1845, the Metropolitan Board of Works was established to build the Metropolitan District Railway, which would link the area to the expanding suburbs of London. In 1848, the Board of Works was given the task of constructing a main water supply pumping station, which would consist of a four-storey structure for the storage of water. By 1850, a contract had been given to Thomas Yeomans and Sons to build the main pumping station for the Brixton Waterworks. The works were completed in 1862. In the 1870s, the area around the station was developed as a new residential district called Brixton Road. By the 1890s, the area began to be subject to gentrification, and it was decided that the main pumping station, by then in disrepair, would be demolished. In 1894, the Brixton Board of Works was established, with an allocation of £35,000 for the demolition of the waterworks. The works were completed by 1896, and the ground floor of the main
